

PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTIONS

One of the characteristics of Marianist Education that has been captured quite clearly during Term 3 has been that of Educating for Adaptation and Change. As a Marianist school, we see Mary as our model, and she truly adapted to all that was expected of her, and we seek to be faith filled individuals who accept challenge just as Mary did. When Mary said yes to the Holy Spirit, she was called to 'do whatever he tells you.' We are called too, in a similar way, to action.

In Term 3, we have seen the call to action, and the commitment to adaptation and change in many of our key events. Participation in the Indigenous Immersion Trips was particularly significant, with students and staff from the Notre Dame campus travelling to the Dusty Feet Mob in the Flinders Ranges and the St Paul's students and staff travelling to the True Fellas program in Dalby. On these immersion experiences, participants were able to come to a greater understanding of the experiences of Aboriginal people through engaging with members of the community and participating in conversations. It is only through gaining a greater understanding of others that you can advocate for change, whether it be change in behaviour, or attitudes. In the words of Harper Lee, "You never really understand a person until you consider things from [their] point of view". These immersion experiences have provided our students with the possibility to view the world differently, because they have been witnesses to different perspectives.

For all students, Term 3 marks the time when decisions must be made for the future. Assemblies are held, information evenings scheduled, and discussions started about what studies will be undertaken the next year. We are frequently focused on what is to come, and it is important to never lose sight of just how often we must make decisions, to adapt and change as we mature.

To adapt and change is so crucially important. Meeting the future head-on requires it. In the words of Henri Rosseau S.M '...the future belongs to the enterprising...Now then, this is the role for young people who do not have to reproduce the past, but rather have the challenge of creating new ways of thinking, of working, in keeping with current intellectual developments.'

At Emmanuel College, we seek to offer experiences both within and beyond the classroom to provide the ability for our student to adapt and meet change as they are faced with it, now and into the future.
















FAITH AND JUSTICE REPORT



On Friday 28 July, six students and two teachers travelled to Portugal for World Youth Day in response to Pope Francis's call for young Catholics to "Go with Haste" into the world as pilgrims. This was the 16th World Youth Day (WYD), a significant event in the life of the universal Catholic Church, which is celebrated every 3 – 4 years in a different host country. This year they were able to participate in a candlelight vigil in Fatima and explore the sights of beautiful Lisbon. They walked on foot to the pilgrimage site, a distance of 10kms in 38C degree heat, to sleep out under the stars and celebrate Mass with the Pope and our own Archbishop of Melbourne, Peter Comensoli, with 3 million other young people from all around the world. It was an amazing experience for our students. The next World Youth Day will be in Korea, 2027.





On Thursday 27 July, SPC students from Years 10 to 11 had the opportunity to engage with the Dhiiyaan community as part of the True Fella Indigenous Immersion Trip to Dalby, Queensland. They were welcomed through a smoking ceremony by loving and caring custodians of a 40-acre property named Bethel, 'House of God'. During times of reflection and learning, they immersed themselves through deep connection with the Creator of Spirit, the land

(horse work & spiritual sessions), and by 'giving back' to the community (general maintenance). They listened to powerful and inspiring intergenerational stories



about the divine and its relationship with the Barunggam people, where they also had time to reflect through journalling. After four days of sleeping in swags, they all took away key knowledge and a deeper respect towards the interrelationship between Christianity and Indigenous beliefs.

Emmanuel staff and students raised over \$9,000 for the Cancer Council by walking, to show support for those who have been impacted by cancer. On the evening of Friday 25 August, more than 60 staff and students came together at our Notre Dame campus and walked laps as part of the Relay For Life.





NDC students and two staff undertook the Indigenous immersion experience to Pichi Pichi in South Australia's Flinders Ranges. They came back with many stories of the experiences they had, the cultural experiences they shared and the wisdom they gained particularly through their interactions with the Dusty Feet Mob.







WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE LIBRARY?

Book Week is the libraries' most anticipated event for Term 3, and each day, books and reading were celebrated to this year's theme 'Read, Grow, Inspire'. Year 8 students attended an author talk with Martin Chatterton, who had the entire year level captivated as he drew pictures of students, talked about 'writing from your own experience and the future of writing in an Al world'. Book Week activities included painting and planting pots, Kahoot quizzes, paper craft, origami and giant Jenga, which made Book Week 2023 a fantastic week for everyone that participated.

This year the Emmanuel College Libraries introduced Accelerated Reader for our Year 7 cohort. Students are encouraged to read as many books as they can and take short comprehension guizzes once they have finished reading a book. The more students read, the more rewards they receive along the way until they reach a million words. Finley Lewington (SPC 7B) was the first student at the College to join the club, shortly after joined by Patrick Creaney (SPC 7A).





SACCSS REPORT






