

Dear Parents and Friends

As we conclude our short week, our Year 12 students of 2023 are now entering into the final days of their examinations. The Year 8 to 11 students are also entering their examination period for Semester 2. I wish to extend my best wishes to all students as they prepare for and undertake these examinations.

Students in Year 11 and 12 for 2024 will also soon receive notification of the subjects they will be enrolled in next year. We look forward to welcoming students to their 2024 classes when Head Start begins on Thursday 16 November.

I was very fortunate today to attend the New Tech Network Leadership Day, which focused on Student Centred Learning. This model of learning, which previously saw the introduction of Project-Based Learning, will continue to provide direction on how we engage students in learning within our classrooms in the future.



I wish to provide some notification to the community regarding the internal arrangements for learning at the College in 2024. At the beginning of Term 2, I outlined the changes that had been made to the structure of the College day. This impacted on the start time, end time and the length of classes. The altered bell times that have been implemented since then were for one year only, as we used the remainder of 2023 to refine our scheduling for the benefit of learning for students at both campuses.

Earlier this year, the College provided an opportunity for community feedback about learning, which included matters pertaining to the length of classes. Alongside this, the College also undertook a full timetable analysis. As a result of this feedback, the College will be making the following changes to the timetabling of classes for 2024:

- The College will operate a 6 period day
- Period length will be 49 minutes
- This model will enable single and double periods to occur within the timetable
- Two joint provision lines will operate, providing more successful allocation of subjects for senior students

Further details, and the schedule of bell times, will be provided to families next week. I thank those who provided feedback: it was invaluable in informing our decision-making and that we reflected the needs of students and parents. I take this opportunity, given the current world events, to pray for peace in the words of John Paul II:

Lord Jesus Christ, who are called the Prince of Peace, who are Yourself our peace and reconciliation, who so often said, "Peace to you" - please grant us peace.

Make all men and women witnesses of truth, justice and brotherly love. Banish from their hearts whatever might endanger peace. Enlighten our rulers that they may guarantee and defend the great gift of peace.

VCE Head Start

The VCE Head Start program commences for all Year 10 and 11 students, including those students doing VCEVM, on Thursday 16 November and continues to Thursday 23 November. Students will be informed of their Head Start timetable. A reminder that students are expected to be in normal College uniform for the duration of the Head Start program.

ATTENDANCE and WHY IT'S NOT OK TO BE AWAY!

It is an important time for students to be at school every day and on time in order to finish the year well. Please bear in mind the cumulative effects of absence. While the effects of irregular attendance adversely impact directly on a student's current progress and understanding, the long-term scars to his/her learning are devastating. Just as research has proven that exposure to the sun as a youngster can cause irreparable damage to his/her skin that will emerge later in life, poor attendance mirrors this. The gaps in knowledge and understanding accumulated in Years 7 to 10 become a glaring problem in Years 11 and 12. Subject development is a sequential building process that relies heavily on a firm grasp of each section of material. When a part is missing, the student finds immense difficulty in learning the work and real frustration sets in; this effectively makes school life a genuine chore.

In many senior classes across all subjects, teachers spend much valuable class time trying to fill in the gaps in students' knowledge caused through parent-condoned absences. Time is lost on teaching the Years 11 and 12 subject material; a real disadvantage to our students. This situation can be substantially reduced if not eliminated by saying 'NO' to any student absences other than genuine illness or serious family issues. Let's work together to make a difference to your child's future. Should you require support in saying 'NO' to your son/daughter in regard to any absences other than illness, please contact the relevant homeroom teacher or House Leader. Let's work together to support your child's education and make a difference to their future.

The Dr Justin Coulson article this week is titled *Teaching Kids to be Kind*. How what you say creates your child's mindset, including their manners, kindness and compassion towards others. Too often we've tried to teach about growth mindset, instead of teaching for a growth mindset. We want our children to apologise with empathy when needed, say *please* and *thank you* and highlight the significance of showing compassion towards other kids. Importantly, the role parents play in helping develop a growth mindset in their child has been largely overlooked. We would encourage you to take a moment and read this informative article.

As the year is quickly drawing to a close, it is important that everyone remains focused as the curriculum will be delivered right to the last day. Students need to continue to work on their goals and their homework plans in order to develop the right habits to assist them in their transition to the next year level.




Christmas Appeal

National Kindness Day

Teaching Kids to be Kind

"Say 'please'."

"Give Johnny a turn with the ball."

"Go say sorry to Mia right now!"

"What's the magic word?"

"Now say 'Thank you Miss Kelly'."

We want to raise our children to be kind, compassionate, and thoughtful. But if you've ever been on the receiving end of a scripted apology or a forced 'thank you', you know that having kids parrot back polite words doesn't quite cut it. If we want to raise children who are genuinely kind, we need to realise that micromanaging our kids' interactions isn't the right way to encourage moral behaviour. Instead, we need to take a holistic approach: one that encourages discussion, role modelling, and highlighting opportunities for kindness.

As Mr Rogers taught, "Like many other values our children get from us, compassion is more likely to be caught than taught."

Please and thank you

Politeness and compassion are different, though related, aspects of a bigger personality trait called 'agreeableness'. Politeness refers to being respectful, having good manners, and abiding by the rules of society. It's definitely something we want to encourage in our kids, but if we want them to internalise politeness, we need to go beyond just reminding them to say "please" and "thank you".

Discuss and reflect on moments when you noticed your child speaking politely. It doesn't need to be a big deal, just simply observe what you saw. "I noticed you saying please when you wanted your sister to share her snacks. I wonder if speaking to her so politely helped her want to share."

Role model politeness, especially to people who are serving you – such as retail staff and waiters.

Highlight opportunities by reminding them well in advance to speak politely. For example, if it's your child's first time buying something at the shop or booking their own doctors' appointment, you can role play what to say, which includes saying "please" and "thank you".

Saying sorry

Very few social interactions between kids occur without someone getting hurt, either physically or emotionally. When things go wrong, kind kids don't just say sorry, they are sorry. Being able to emotionally understand what another person feels is called empathy, a skill which can be strengthened with practice.

Discuss what others may be feeling, using books as a springboard. How are the characters feeling? Why are they feeling that way?

Role model empathy, by allowing them to experience the type of emotional understanding that you want them to demonstrate. This looks like taking time to understand their feelings, even when they're upset or excited about things that seem trivial.

Highlight opportunities to respond empathetically. For example, if their little sister is crying, nudge them towards offering her a hug or a kind word.

Spontaneous kindness

In my opinion, one of the proudest moments we can experience as parents is when we see our children treating others kindly through their own initiative. When our kids are the ones mowing the lawn of the elderly neighbours, or letting the youngest kid on the team have a shot at the goal, or splitting their donut in half to share with their baby brother... these are the moments that fill our hearts. How do we raise kids who are kind without prodding?

- Discuss what it means to be kind, and do it frequently and informally, like on car rides or around the dinner table. You could ask them how they feel when someone is kind to them, and how they feel when they are kind to others.
- ▶ Role model acts of kindness, such as taking a meal to a friend who is sick.
- ▶ Highlighting opportunities to join you in acts of kindness, or to plan their own experiences. You could let them know that you will be visiting someone at the nursing home and that you would love them to join you. Or maybe you can let them know that you are baking cookies as a gift for their teacher and ask them if they would like to make something too.

Raising kind kids isn't something we accomplish in a day. Much like becoming a firefighter, or a doctor, or a neuroscientist, becoming kind takes time, practice, and mentoring.
