Campus Leaders

It has been a fantastic start to the school year at both Notre Dame and St Paul's Campus. The positive attitude and warmth the students have shown staff and each other is a very encouraging sign for a good year ahead. Finally, the majorities' readiness to learn and get on with the hard work required for success has been somewhat inspiring. We are all excited about the achievement that the 2020 year will bring to our community.

All the Year 7 students have settled well into the routine of secondary school life – smiling faces and happy noises around the Learning Street, classrooms and playground tell a great story. Congratulations to the young men of Year 7 at St Paul's on a wonderful camp experience at Portsea. Although they came back tired they were full of stories of overcoming challenges and building friendships. A report is included in this newsletter.

The SPC Year 12 Retreat held at Rutherford Park was a wonderful experience for both students and staff. This experience went a long way to ensuring that the Year 12 students are equipped with the strategies to manage the pressures of Year 12.

The majority of students have shown pride in the way they wear their uniform and are to be commended. However, there are a small percentage of students who choose to ignore the uniform requirements and expectations. A number of students have been spoken to about these expectations and all families are reminded that the Uniform Policy is clearly outlined in the Student Diary on pages 14-16. Please note the following points in particular, and the action that will be followed by College staff for continuing non-compliance:

Make-up and nail polish are not permitted. On the first instance, students presenting with make-up and nail polish will be required to remove it and will be issued with a system detention. Fake nails are not permitted.

Male students are required to be **clean shaven** at all times. Students who disregard this requirement will be required to shave at Student Services or may be asked to go home and return appropriately groomed and will be issued with a lunchtime detention.

Summer dress and kilt length to be no shorter than 5cm from the top of the knee. Please refer to the uniform policy in the Student Handbook on pages 14-16.

Boys' trousers are to be grey in colour with a black belt. They should not be tight, fashion pants but regulation school attire. Boys are also reminded that only grey socks are to be worn with grey shorts and only white socks with PE uniform.

Correct Sock colours need to be observed. Plain white (not branded) with summer dress and sports uniform, grey for boys when wearing summer shorts and grey or black with long trousers.

Piercings Students may wear a single ear stud in the lobe only. The wearing of other fashion accessories is not appropriate. Students who choose to wear other items of jewellery can expect to have them confiscated for the duration of the term. Nose rings are not permitted. Clear studs are not acceptable. All piercings must be removed.

From Monday 24 February, students who choose to continue to be in significant breach of the uniform policy will be asked to return home until their uniform meets the College Uniform Policy. Parents will be contacted by phone to collect their child and students will not be permitted to attend class until the matter is addressed.

UNIFORM SHOP – St Paul's Campus

Just a reminder that the uniform shop has re-opened at St Paul's Campus in the McCoy Hall Foyer. This will be open every Wednesday from 1pm – 4pm during the school term and is an opportunity to get measured for any uniform to purchase online or purchase items directly from the shop. (A reminder that only card facilities are provided and no cash will be accepted.) All items of uniform are available for immediate purchase if required however there is limited stock in each size. Congratulations to all students for the enthusiasm and their desire to be active learners that they have shown so far. For some, the concept of homework has been quite daunting, however, it is important that students grasp the valuable aspect of this part of their educational development. The Student Diary is a crucial tool for success in establishing a regular routine of homework at home.

Homework is assigned to reinforce the skills and content covered during class and is an invaluable support to each student's learning process. It is also a benefit to teachers in monitoring their understanding of class work. Should you have any concerns regarding the nature or the quantity of homework set, please contact your child's Homeroom Teacher or House Leader for further clarification. Remember there are 5 periods in the school day - 4 at school and one at home.

Parents are also reminded that if your child is unwell, they should not attend school. We do have a sick bay, where students may rest for a short time before returning to class, however, if your child is significantly unwell then you will be called to collect them and take them to a doctor if required. Please ensure that your details are current. Senior students, however, should always attend the College, as absence without a medical certificate may compromise their VCE studies. They should also always attend for exams as there is no opportunity to undertake these at an alternative date/time. Please note there have been some cases of head lice reported so please check your child's hair and take appropriate action. Please remember that long hair should always be tied back and this will also help to reduce the possibility of infection.

Goal setting is an important aspect for achieving success. Below are some tips that you can discuss with your daughter or son at home.

- Set your goals. How can you be motivated if you don't know what you're aiming for? Your written goals are solid reminders of what it is that you want.
- Revisit your goals regularly and religiously.
- Use the 'divide' and conquer' technique by breaking down your goals into pieces. Work one piece at a time.
- The baby steps first. Start on something easy or interesting. Too often we fall into the 'all or nothing' mentality.
- Allow yourself to feel incredibly satisfied when you achieve your little benchmarks. Small victories all add up.
- Savour little victories along the way. They are every bit as important as the end goal. They keep you going when you have a setback.
- Reward yourself for small victories. You MUST do this because setbacks WILL come.
- Work with a friend to keep each other motivated.
- Don't wait until the mood strikes you makes the start on something – anything. Once you've started you'll keep going.
- Know that the best way to keep motivated is doing what you planned to do.

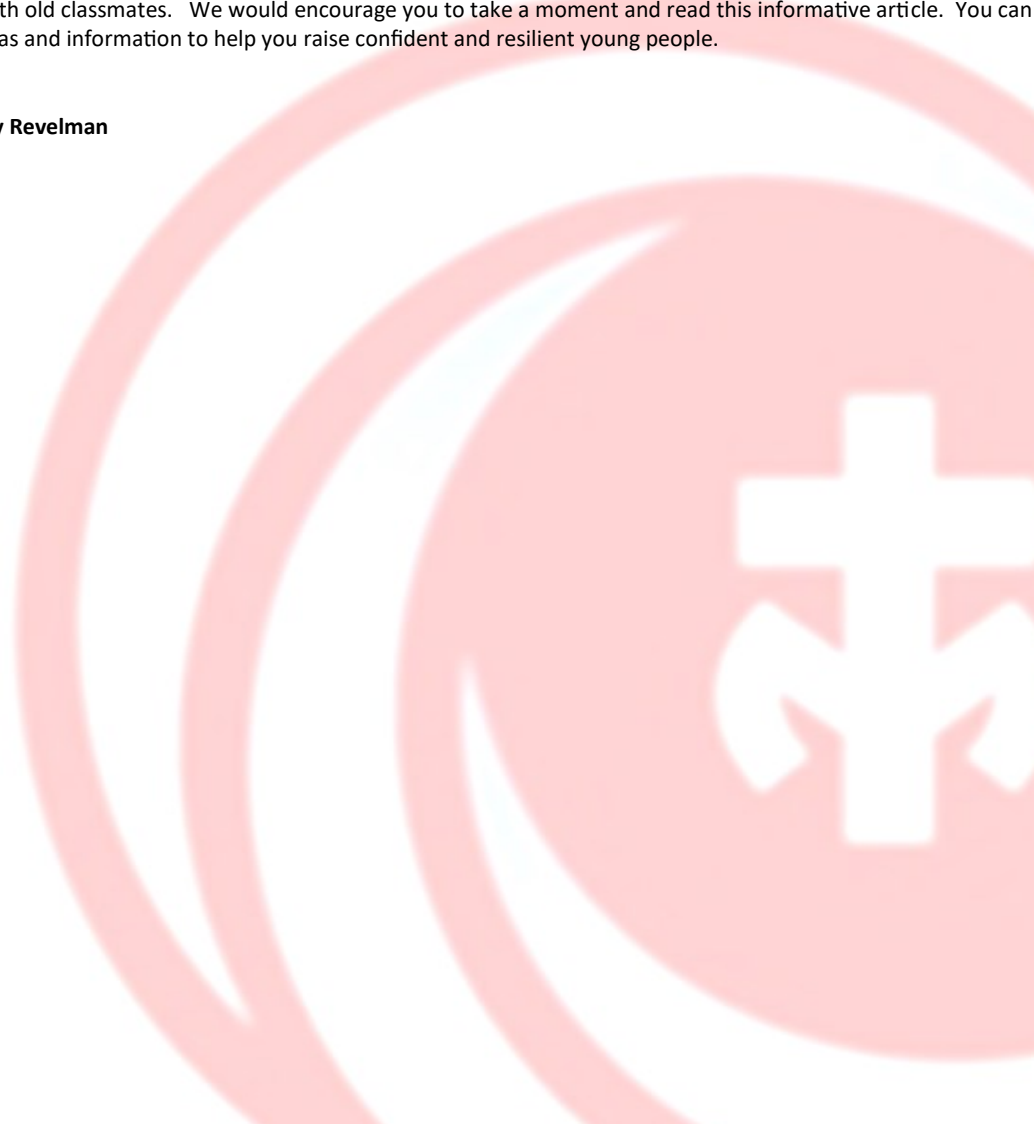

VCAL Camp

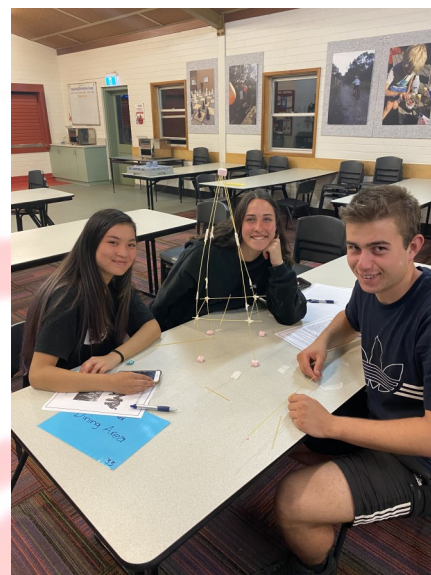



Making new friends and staying in touch with old classmates



As a parent there is a great deal you can do to help your child adjust socially at the start of the school year. Here are some tips to help.

Encourage your child to be open to new friendships

An open, friendly attitude is a child or young person's best social asset. Students who open to forming new friendships are more likely to succeed than those who seek solitude, who are critical and who limit themselves to just one or two familiar faces. Encourage your child or young person to seek out new friendships, even though they may feel uncomfortable or strange at first.

Encourage healthy relationships

Do all you can to encourage healthy relationships based on respect and common courtesy. Generally, when a relationship is healthy a child feels safe, valued and able to speak up. Unhealthy relationships, such as cliques, are restrictive, one-sided and are full of gossip and criticism.

Encourage inclusiveness

Studies have shown inclusiveness to be one of the prime social skills shared by socially successful students. Encourage your child or young person to include others in games, conversations, team activities and other group activities. Inclusiveness is not just a wonderful friendship skill, it's strong leadership attribute as well.

Encourage friendships with both genders

If you are in a co-education environment encourage your child to form friendships with both boys and girls. This is particularly valid if your child has siblings of their own gender, or don't have siblings. It's through these early relationships that we gain the confidence to mix with different genders in the later years. Forming friends across genders helps to break down the mystique that sometimes forms, when a child has little contact with the 'other' gender.

Stay in touch with former classmates and school friends

Encourage your child to maintain friendships with former classmates and groups outside of school as this helps to insulate against unfriendly behaviour that they may experience with their close social circle.

Provide social scripts

Your child may benefit from being provided with some social scripts that they can use in common social situations such as meeting a new friend, joining in a game or asking someone else for help. Boys, in particular, can benefit when given the words to use in a variety of different social situations.

Forming new friendships can take time

Meeting new students and forming new friendships can be anxiety-inducing. If this is the case for your child, then it helps to acknowledge their feelings of discomfort, but also remind them that these feelings will pass. As well discuss the fact that feeling comfortable with new friends often takes time, particularly if your child by nature is reserved or slow to warm up in social situations.

Helping kids work through friendships can be tricky for a parent as you don't have a great deal of control over what happens at school. However, with empathy, patience, encouragement and a supportive attitude you can do a great deal to help your child make a smooth social transition.
